# Swinging Air Force Ball takes flight

THE Air Force Centenary Ball had Brown Hill Hall swinging on Saturday night.

Hosted by the Air Force Association Ballarat Branch, 80 attendees marked the 100th anniversary celebration of the formation of the Royal Australian Air Force in style, dancing the night away to live music from the 1940s era.

AFA Ballarat president Noel Hutchins said it was important to acknowledge the centenary locally.

The RAAF Base in Ballarat played a massive role during World War Two, both in Europe and Africa, as well as in our Battle for Australia in the Pacific and right here at home in our defensive war against the invading Japanese forces," he said.

"It was at the No 1 Wireless Air Gunners School Ballarat where Wireless Air Gunners were trained for war service with Britain's RAF Bomber Command or RAAF Squadrons defending Australia.

"Many of those men lost their lives in action against the Germans, and others in action against the Japanese, with many buried in foreign soil."

Recently retired RAAF Wing Commander Daryll Topp, the vicepresident of Air Force Association Victoria, and his wife Gillian travelled up from Melbourne to attend, while local AFA members and the swing-dancing community also enjoyed the night.

Mr Hutchins said singing trio The Pacific Belles were "an absolute delight" performing two half-hour sets, which were a highlight of the event for all.

"I was overjoyed to see so many dancers being able to once again get together on the dance floor after long periods of not having to be able to do so," be said.

"I have never before seen so many very happy dancers, and the night went off without a single hitch."

Originally scheduled as our *Battle for Australia/Air Force 100*Centenary Ball to be held in August 2021, Covid-19 related postponements well beyond 2021 Battle for Australia Day date caused the Ball to finally proceed as our Air Force 100 Centenary Ball.

That we were finally able to proceed with this event in this 100th year anniversary of the formation of the Royal Australian Air Force was in no small way due to the perseverance and tenacity of our Ball organiser Ann Petty.

The night felt special, looked special and was special due to the work that Anne put into the organising of the event.

**THE PHOTO CHALLENGE** Members were recently given the opportunity to win a selection of chocolates by submitting in writing what was special about the photo shown below. Just as well we didn't buy the chocolates for the prize, because nobody really came up with anything close. Yes, several members noted the gentleman having his shoes shined, but not much else.



The location of this photograph is the Boulevard du Temple, Paris, better known at the time as "Crime Boulevard" because of the murders played every night in the dozens of theatres of the boulevard. Normally a place full of Parisians, where are all the people? The photograph was made in 1838 by Louis Daguerre, the brilliant guy that invented the daguerreotype process of photography. After collaborating with Joseph Nicephore Niepce, a French engineer considered as the inventor of photography, Louis Daguerre continued his researches and tried to improve the process, especially the shortening of the exposure time from what was hours down to 15 minutes or less. The exposure time for this photograph was more than ten minutes resulting in anything moving not being recorded on the image. As luck would have it for Louis, the gentleman having his shoes shined and the shoe shiner spent sufficient time in much the same position to become the first human beings to appear in a photograph. For Daguerre to be able to produce images of this quality as he strove to further develop the new invention of photography must have been very exciting for him and he has gone down in history as the first to ever produce a photograph which showed the human form.
