held a strong position in the RAAFA, with its members comprising 10 per cent of the Victorian division.



On 6th June this year we held a commemoration marking the 75th anniversary of D Day and acknowledged the WWII service of our member Margaret Wood.

Twenty five years after D Day, 50 years ago on 6th June this year, another military force was involved in a battle considered by many military historians to be a key moment in the history of Australian operations in Vietnam. **The Battle of Binh Ba**.

At our July social meeting we had a look at this significant battle of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam war and acknowledged the military service of another of our members, Tom Jobling. Tom served in Vietnam for more than a full year with **161 (Independant) Reconnaissance Flight,** (i.e. an Australian Army aviation unit).

Binh Ba is a small rubber plantation village owned by French plantation managers which housed up to 1,300 people. Although the Australians originally felt they were winning over the town's population, it is said that by 1969 it was firmly sympathetic to the communist forces.



Binh Ba was less than 10 km from the Australian Task Force Base at Nui Dat.

Early on the morning of 6th June 1969, a Centurion tank and an armoured recovery vehicle were making their way moving north along the main route to the nearby Fire Support Patrol Base to replace and recover two tanks that had maintenance difficulties and bring them back to the Task Force base. This took them past the village of Binh Ba. It was here that a rocket propelled grenade was fired at them from a nearby house and struck the Centurion's turret wounding the operator and inviting retaliatory machine-gun fire from both vehicles after which they sent a contact report to the base at Nui Dat and continued their journey to the Fire Support Patrol Base.

Helicopter surveillance by 161 Independent Recce Squadron reported that it was likely that two platoons of Viet Cong were stationed in the town. A Ready Reaction Force comprising four different force elements: D company 5 RAR; four Centurion tanks; a troop of Armoured Personnel Carriers; and a battery of six M2A2 Howitzers in direct support, were prepared to respond.

It was decided that a sweep of the town was necessary in order to clear the enemy. At around 1120 hours the Ready Reaction Force formed up at Nui Dat. The South Vietnamese district chief gave permission for the Australians to attack the village, and ordered civilians to evacuate.

As the Australians advanced towards the village, they saw enemy soldiers moving to take up firing positions and soon came under rocket propelled grenade fire. The decision was made to conduct a sweep of the town from east to west.


The formation was slow-moving as it seemed the enemy was firing from just about every house. It soon became clear that there was more than just two platoons of Viet Cong. In reality, the village was being held by 1st Battalion, 33rd North Vietnamese Army Regiment which was well equipped with anti-armour weapons. Troops were soon ordered out of the village amid concerns they might be 'stuck in the middle of the village' and surrounded by the enemy. B Company 5RAR was mobilised from Nui Dat to support troops as they regrouped for a second sweep of the village.

During the action, air support and artillery support proved invaluable.

Reconnaissance from Army helicopters was able to identify enemy concentrations in the village and in the surrounding rubber plantations while a light fire team of two RAAF Bushrangers, (helicopter gunships), were very effective in providing air support as infantry and armour re-organised for the second sweep.

The RAAF crews did well to also cover the tanks which were immobilised by antiarmour fire and which were at risk of being overrun.

This second sweep was successful in neutralising most of the enemy forces, however the

Australians were still not satisfied that the village had been cleared and, totally exhausted, they harboured nearby for the night. Some enemy troops that tried to escape through the Australian lines under cover of darkness were neutralised.

The next morning a final sweep of Binh Ba was conducted at 0800 hours. The bodies of enemy dead were laid out in front of the schoolhouse upon the request of the Vietnamese district chief.

The village of Binh Ba had suffered extensive damage as these images show. But action to restore was very swift.

By 0900 hours the Australian Civil Affairs Unit began assisting in the resettlement and rebuilding of the village. It was a task that would take four and a half months. The image on page 2 of the RAAF Iroquois flying over Binh Ba was taken several months after the battle and the village had been rebuilt.

The battle would constitute one of the major engagements for Australians in Vietnam. It was also one of the few examples of Australians engaging in urban warfare in Vietnam.

Following my presentation, Tom Jobling gave us a talk on his own and his unit's involvement in the Battle of Binh Ba.

Tom was an Australian Army Sergeant and the part that he played and what he saw from the 'choppers' was most interesting to hear. If you missed it, buy Tom a coffee and let him tell you himself. (*NH*, *Pres.*)

THE 'BATTLE OF BRITAIN' AND THE 'BATTLE FOR AUSTRALIA'

Our Ballarat Branch has been commemorating the Battle of Britain annually on the Sunday closest to 15th September. This year, the 15th September *is* a Sunday, so the Skipton Street Church service will be on Sunday 15th September followed by our commemorative service and our B.O.B. Luncheon. Our State President Mr Max McGregor is confirmed as our Guest Speaker at the luncheon.

I am told that there has been 'some discussion' in recent years as to 'whether or not' to proceed with our Battle of Britain commemorative Service and luncheon. My preference would be for us to continue to do so but to combine it with a Battle for Australia Commemoration.

The Federal Government proclaims Australia's Commemoration Days. Among those for war, in order of significance, is The Battle for Australia Day, (the first Wednesday in September), in third place, only after Anzac Day and Remembrance Day.

When, in June 2008, the Federal Government announced that the first Wednesday of September each year would be the day that would be "Battle for Australia Day" it was said, inter alia, "There will be a series of activities and commemorations occurring **around the date** which will be the first Wednesday in September each year to acknowledge the sacrifice and courage that was something we can all be proud of."

As we hold our B.O.B service on a Sunday in September, I am looking at having our **September Commemoration and Luncheon** as a combined **Battle of Britain and Battle for Australia Day** and maybe in future years making it the Sunday **before** 15th September, (rather than the Sunday **closest**), therefore putting it in **between** the **First Wednesday** (**Battle for Australia**) and **15th September**, (**Battle of Britain**). As we know, neither the Battle of Britain nor the Battle for Australia was confined to a one day battle.

It is intended that the commemorative service will be moved from the Sebastopol Cenotaph to the Australian ex POW Memorial. A flypast will be provided by Branch member Stephen Carter in his Vintage Ryan aircraft.

A *Battle for Australia Commemoration* is really a commemoration of a series of battles fought much closer to home than the battles in which Australian servicemen were involved in Europe; the *Battle of the Coral Sea*, *Battle of Milne Bay* in which the RAAF's No 75 and 76 Kittyhawk Squadrons played such an important part, *Kokoda Track Campaign*. In fact a commemoration honouring all those that defended Australia against the Japanese. All of our Australian servicemen, Army, Navy and Air Force. The Americans and those of the Merchant Navy of all nationalities. Not to forget the suffering of the peoples of the Pacific region including our friends in New Guinea.

I therefore invite members who wish to, to give to me in writing either their support for this move or, again in writing, show reason why we should not move forward with this. Such submissions need to be to me on or before Tuesday 6th August, i.e. our August social meeting date. *(NH, Pres.)*
